Safety Officer

What is a Safety Officer in Little League?

A Safety Officer is responsible for overseeing and implementing safety initiatives within their local league or district to ensure a safe environment for players, coaches, volunteers, and spectators.

- Each league is required to have a League Safety Officer who manages safety at the local level.
- Each district must have a District Safety Officer, who can also be a league officer, ensuring safety compliance across multiple leagues.

- Must be renewed periodically (2 or 3 years TBD)
- Protects players and upholds league integrity

Little League Alberta – Zero Tolerance Policy

- Little League Alberta has a **Zero Tolerance Policy** for **abuse**, **harassment**, **and violence** toward players, coaches, officials, volunteers, and parents.
- Abuse includes **emotional**, **physical**, **and verbal mistreatment**—it has no place in our league.
 - Physical violence = Immediate suspension (minimum 1 year, up to a lifetime ban).
 - Emotional abuse = Progressive discipline, starting with mandatory education and escalating to suspension.
- Every participant deserves a **safe**, **positive environment** to learn and grow.

We are setting the standard—help us create the safest and most respected Little League in Canada.



Emergency Response Plan



- Clearly defined emergency response plan (ERP) for each facility. -
- There is an ERP contained within the Risk Assessment that can be used

Quick access to emergency contacts and medical facilities

First Aid

- Every coach's equipment bag must have a fully stocked, up-to-date first aid kit that is replenished as needed.
- Prior to starting a game, coaches should identify a first aider (if available) on-site to assist in case of injuries.
- When in doubt, take them out!

This ensures that injury response is proactive rather than reactive and that every game has a plan in place for potential medical incidents.

How to scan a QR Code



- **Secure Storage & Review** by the Safety Officer to track injury patterns.


